

Flood Damage on Township Roads

In mid September Lee Township received more than 8 inches of rain. The Brushy Creek culvert on 102nd Avenue between 48th and 49th Streets was washed out. According to the Allegan County Road Commission, the road will most likely be closed until mid 2009 as the plans are being designed for a concrete box culvert. There also was another section of road damaged by this same storm. Other damage from the storm included a section of 49th Street between 104th and 105th Avenue. Plans are underway to repair the road.

In the last several years repairs have been made on three water crossings: Barber Creek crossing on 104^{th} Avenue between 55^{th} and 56^{th} Streets, Scott Lake Creek crossing on 109^{th} Avenue between 57^{th} and 58^{th} Streets, and a water crossing on Baseline Road between 59^{th} and 60^{th} Streets. The 109^{th} Avenue crossing was paid for with a grant. The Barber Creek and Baseline repairs as well as the Brushy Creek will be the responsibility of the township as is the maintenance of all secondary roads.

2008 Winter Tax

Tax bills will be mailed by December 1st. The Treasurer will collect tax at the **Township Office** on **Tuesday's (9am – 12pm and Friday's, (9am – 5pm)** the months of December, January, and February. A 3% penalty will be added to winter tax paid after February

**Unpaid Summer 2008 tax must be paid at the Township (interest added 1% per month beginning September 2008.

Beginning March 1, 2009 unpaid taxes (Summer & Winter) become delinquent and must be paid to the <u>ALLEGAN COUNTY TREASURER</u>, with an additional 4% administrative fee and 1.5% interest per month. Calling the County Treasurers Office 673-0260 or <u>www.allegancounty.org</u> can verify the correct amount to be paid.

Defer: penalty and interest

Qualifying Senior Citizens or Permanently Disabled Persons may defer penalty and interest on tax payments until April 30th on <u>Homeowner's</u> <u>Principal Residence only</u>. Notify the Township Treasurer to apply for a <u>Deferment Application</u> when you receive your tax bill.

Carefully review your tax bill for errors on P.R.E. or MTB. All errors should be reported to the Assessor (269-699-7619).

The December Board of Review will meet <u>Monday December 8, 2008 at 5:00pm</u> to correct any mutual mistake of fact or clerical errors on tax bill.

CLEAN TEAM WRAPS UP ITS 2ND YEAR

The Lee Township Clean Team has had a successful summer and fall helping to keep our local roads tidy and clean. Thanks to those regulars (few but committed) who have helped to clean on the monthly work dates as well as all the residents that do their part in not throwing trash out along our roadsides. The team has seen a great improvement in the past two years.

As fall approaches, there is a temptation to burn leaves in the yard and garbage in the burn barrel. The Clean Team reminds us that burning of leaves and trash releases highly toxic gasses and causes air pollution. Burning garbage contaminates the air we breathe and the dioxins that are released are harmful to children, pregnant women and can cause cancer and other many other health issues.

Instead, the team asks residents to "compost" their leaves in a compost pile, use them on woods paths or locate a gardener who might like to use them to build their soil fertility. Leaves make a wonderful, loamy compost material for flowers, shrubs and vegetable gardens!

We still need volunteers to assistance in the clean up process for next year. This would be the perfect opportunity for a scout group, school or church group looking for community service hours. We will begin our monthly work dates again in May 2009.

A Little Bit of Lee Township History......



THE PAST IS PROLOGUE

Charles Laraway, who lived in Joliet, Ill and Lee Township, built a home and farmed on a parcel of land stretching from 109th Avenue to 108th Avenue north to south and from 58th Street to 60th Street east to west. At present, we are unaware of Charles' wife's name but we do know he had a brother named William who also owned property in Lee Township. The exact year that the farmhouse was built is unknown but it was a type common to the 1870's through 1890's. The house was Victorian in style with two bedrooms and a large hallway upstairs, a parlor, butler's pantry, large kitchen, summer kitchen and two bedrooms downstairs. There was an outdoor privy.

Charles' son John, who was born in 1864, married born in 1867, Margaret Kakabaker, from Kalamazoo. John and Margaret moved to the house in Lee Township and started their married life in their new home with all its modern conveniences (!). They raised milk cows, horses, chickens, asparagus, pickles, cauliflower, rhubarb, and other necessities for rural life in the early part of the last century. This, we understand, was a typical diversified farming operation for the time. There was a large barn with a windmill in front of it that existed into the 1950's. John and Margaret adopted their only child Royal "Barney" Laraway when he was five in 1912. When Barney and Helen Daliedan were married, they lived in the house with his parents at different times in their married life. Margaret Laraway passed away in 1951 and John followed in 1955. Barney and Helen's three children, Doris, Buster and Babe, have many fond memories of the old homestead and life on the farm. They lived in various places in Lee Township after permanently moving from the old home place. The farm passed from the Laraway family in the 1940's through a succession of families until it burned in the 1980's, possibly around 1985.

Memories of the farm, the warmth of family life and the neighborliness of folks who lived in Lee Township prompted Babe to recreate the old homestead. The "new" Victorian house was moved to a portion of the old farmstead in 2008 from the Fennville area. It had been slated to be used as a practice burn for the Ganges Fire Department. Fortunately for the charming old house it was rescued at the eleventh hour and find's it's new home somewhat similar to it's old home on the Hunsberger farm in Ganges. There are blueberry fields to the east, wooded areas and other rescued and recycled homes in the neighborhood. In fact, most of the neighborhood consists of homes moved from other areas. There's another story for another time!

This house had all its windows removed in preparation for the burn and the downstairs, which consists of two bedrooms, a parlor, large kitchen, bathroom and dining area modernized in the 1960's with glamorous wood paneling, plywood kitchen cabinets, dropped ceilings, vinyl floor tiles and shag carpeting. Enough time has passed that almost all of those elements are back in style! Fortunately, the three upstairs bedrooms and attic space retain all their original charm with beautiful woodwork, original old wallpapers and some faux wood graining from the turn of the last century. It is Babe's plan to update and modernize all the necessities and to antiquate all the modernization done in the 1960's. This has been a real family project with Babe's sons, Tom and Tim, and grandson, Royal, all working to move the house, Babe doing all the grading and filling and trotting out some of his old carpentry skills. I'm reserving all the decorating and painting for myself. Sorry Mom, I know how much you love painting! Its future is as a family home for a family member.

AT THE PULLMAN CROSSROADS LOOKING WEST... By Lester Rawson

Some time in the early 1940's, we moved here from the South Haven area. Within a couple years of our move here, a severe winter blizzard hit the area. I think it lasted about a week. I must have been about 10 or 12 years old at the time. After what seemed like forever, the storm finally blew itself out and left us snowbound. We were living in an old house on the west side of the road on 54^{th} Street about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile from the corner of 102^{nd} and 54^{th} Street.

After several days of the snow plows not showing up, my father decided it was time for the Rawson males to shovel our way out and so it was. The snow had crusted over so we had to cut it into blocks and shovel it away. We shoveled for the better part of a week to dig our way out. As I remember, the drifted snow was about 4 to 6 feet deep on the left side of the road facing north.

After digging our way to the main road, I road with my father to Pullman for food supplies. There was a two story grocery on the north side of the street mid-way between 56th Street and the railroad tracks. I believe it was called Mac's Grocery. We bought our food supplies, which included hamburger . I still remember the hamburgers that were made after the trip to that store. To this day, I can tell you those hamburgers tasted like the finest steak anyone could ever hope for!
